## **CSTM CONFERENCE, 2003**

The 2003 Conference and AGM of the Canadian Society for Traditional Music will be held in Athabasca, Alberta, from Friday October 31<sup>st</sup> to Sunday November 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Conference theme is "Since 'The Seeds of Love': A Century of Traditional Music". Papers are welcome on any aspect of Canadian traditional song or instrumental music (or on any of our numerous source traditions, Aboriginal, African, American, Asian, Celtic, or European), and proposals should be sent to us at the address below by September 15<sup>th</sup>.

We plan to keep the conference fee low (\$30.00), and it will be waived for anyone giving a paper or singing in the Saturday night concert, which will be jointly sponsored by the Heartwood Folk Club. The second half of that concert will showcase traditional ballad singers Moira Cameron and Paddy Tutty (and, we hope, Anita Best), while the first half will feature some of our CSTM regulars, including Mike Ballantyne, Jon and Rika Bartlett, John Leeder, and Murray Shoolbraid (among others). Check the back cover for recordings by four of those mentioned. There will also be an informal Singers' Circle on Friday evening, and a Ballad Workshop during the day on Saturday. Don't be put off by the conference location. Athabasca is not hard to reach: you fly to Edmonton International, take a shuttle to the Greyhound depot, and it is two hours north by bus. Or you can drive from the airport in just over two hours. We expect to have a mini-bus supplementing the Greyhound service, and we hope to be able to billet most delegates. By mid-July we plan to have an information sheet available about travel and accommodation options.
